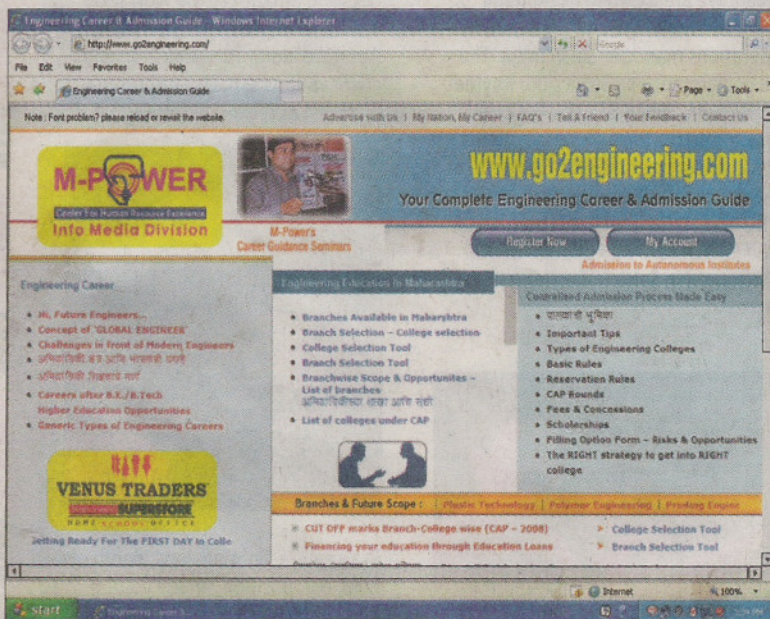
dents have all the material to make an informed decision."
